We are two Pākehā women, mother and daughter, tangata tiriti o Aotearoa. As citizens of Aotearoa, our life and work are intimately connected to the context of this land, this place. Our passion is creating and supporting just and respectful relationships in partnership with children, parents, whānau, educators, tangata whenua and tauwiwi/pākehā. As we walk alongside our tamariki on their life journey, it is our privilege to be partners with them as they grow into active citizens of Aotearoa, confident in who they are and how they can contribute to the world.

We believe that for learning to be lasting it needs to be embodied. By combining experiential practices with a sound understanding of research we provide the ideal learning platform. Learning and education are transformative and in the process of transformation both the individual and the world are transformed. Our courses offer new learning which connects with and seeks to extend, the participants' current knowledge and practices.

***Hūtia te rito o te harakeke e. Kei hea kē te kōmako e kō?
Kī mai ki ahau he aha te mea? Nui o te ao māku e kī atu.
He tangata, he tangata, he tangata.***

If you cut the centre (te rito) out of the flax bush (harakeke), there will be nowhere for the bellbird to sing. What is the most important thing in the world? It is people, people, people.

This proverb likens the harakeke to the whānau. Te rito represents the child, the leaves encompassing te rito symbolise the parents and the outside leaves symbolise the tīpuna/grandparents and community that surrounds the child. If we cut te rito out, the harakeke will die and there will be no flowers full of nectar for the bellbird to feed and sing from. As whānau, ECC and the community, we need to work together to raise our tamariki to their full potential and be active citizens of Aotearoa.

A Graduate from Victoria University in 2015 with a BA in Te Reo Māori, Māori Studies, and Environmental Studies I have natural skills in facilitation, communication and a strong sense of community. I have tutored stage1 Te Reo Māori at Victoria University of Wellington, taught community Māori classes and facilitated Treaty of Waitangi workshops for Early Childhood Teachers. Well versed in the Pikler Approach, I facilitate Baby's Place and Toddler's Place, courses that support parents and babies/toddlers to grow in partnership. As well as these courses I have designed and facilitated Kōrerotia Te Reo – an 8 week reo Māori class for Early Childhood teachers. As Co-director of the Brothers and Sisters Collective, I work across the strands of art, education and community to deliver a diverse range of projects.
